


UNITED STATES OF AMERICA





Facts About the United States

- It has 50 states, a federal district (District of Columbia), and 14 territories.
- There are 6 regions: New England, Mid Atlantic, The South, The Midwest, The Southwest, and The West.
- The national flag has 13 stripes for the 13 original colonies and 50 white stars for the 50 states.
- National animal: American Bison, national tree: Oak Tree, national bird: Bald Eagle, and national flower: rose.
- Government: Constitutional or Federal republic
- Languages: English, Spanish (The United States does not have an official language).
- Population: 341.8 Million (ranked 3).
- Current President: Joe Biden.
- Major mountain ranges: Rocky Mountains and Appalachian Mountains.



STATE WITH THE LARGEST POPULATION CALIFORNIA





California has a population of 39.03 million (2022).

Fun Fact: The California Gold Rush was sparked by the discovery of gold nuggets in the Sacramento Valley in early 1848 and was arguably one of the most significant events to shape American history during the first half of the 19th century. With a total of S2 billion worth of precious metal was extracted from the area during the Gold Rush, which peaked in 1852.

STATE WITH THE SMALLEST POPULATION WYOMING








LARGEST STATE IN THE UNITED STATES

ALASKA



At 665,384 square miles, it is more than double the size of the second largest state Texas, and more than 400 times the size of the smallest, Rhode Island.

Fun Fact: The Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race, annual dogsled race run in March between Anchorage and Nome, Alaska, U.S. The course of the race is roughly 1,100 miles. The origin of the Iditarod stemmed from when no capable pilot was available during Alaska's diphtheria epidemic of 1925, a team of mushers battled blizzard conditions and rushed serum to icebound Nome. This heroic action, called the "Great Race of Mercy," brought renewed international fame to the trail. Today's race commemorates both the serum run and Alaska's frontier past.

SYMBOLS BALD EAGLE



- Symbolizes courage, strength, and freedom.
- It can be seen in many places like the President's flag and on a one dollar bill.

LIBERTY BELL



- Located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
- It rang when Congress signed the Declaration of Independence.
- In 1846 a crack appeared.

- She was a gift from France.
- Known as Lady Liberty because she is a symbol of freedom and democracy.
- She represents hope and freedom to the immigrants who came here from other countries.

- Washington, D.C.
 George Washington is the only President who did not live there.
- The President's Office is called the Oval Office.

HIGH-SCHOOL IN THE U.S.


• High school is the American form of secondary education.

 Extracurricular activities




COLLEGE IN THE U.S.
